### **Thornton Rust Institute centenary celebrations**

It was wonderful to see so many people at the centenary dinner at the end of October. The Institute was dressed to impress (thank you Paul Raven, Richard Loukota and Rob Cromey-Hawke for hanging the bunting and balloons) and there was a terrific buzz in the air as we wished the Institute a happy hundredth birthday. We followed the dinner with some open sessions in the Institute displaying photographs, maps and other information about the founding of the building and its role in village life over the last 100 years. We had 71 visitors over the four sessions including walkers, holiday-makers and people from nearby villages. Rob and Rachel Newall are working on a means of documenting and sharing all the exhibits so that villagers can enjoy looking at them in their own time. A huge heartfelt thank you goes to everyone who shared information, hosted, baked cakes and took the time to visit.

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#### Thoughts from the Letting Secretary

We have all enjoyed recent celebrations for the centenary anniversary of the Thornton Rust Institute, and I have had the privilege of serving the Institute for the past thirteen of those one hundred years as the letting secretary. It is no exaggeration to say tha1t I have enjoyed every moment of it, giving me the opportunity to meet a wide diversity of organisations, groups and individuals, all wishing to come together to share in what the Institute can offer. We have heard of the improvements made, particularly during the time of Covid and the introduction of Wi-Fi contributing to the needs of the 21st Century. But in our quest for improvements, we must never lose sight of our aims in providing not only a focus for opportunity, recreation and comfort for the parishioners of Thornton Rust but also for those beyond the bounds of our parish. It is here, we can offer wonderful surrounding in the heart of Wensleydale, a chance to 'get away from it all'.

My thoughts often turn back to the days, one hundred years ago as I stroll around the hall late at night after a function, making sure everything is secure. All is quiet as I approach the storeroom, once the 'reading room' where gentlemen of the day would read the newspaper and a chance to catch up with current events, providing of course, they maintain the rules of the Institute. We hear of one such rule where women were openly discouraged if not banned from attending this reading room, I wonder what the conversation might have been. I doubt very much if it was following the fortunes of Clarence Birdseye, who in 1924 invented quick freezing methods, bringing frozen foods to many, or perhaps doing the crossword puzzle, first published by Simon Schuster in the same year. No, it was probably about Ramsay MacDonald forming the first albeit short-lived Labour government discussing many things not least equal voting rights for women, although it would be another four years before the 1928 Equal Franchise Act giving equal voting rights to women over the age of twenty-one came into force. Horrors! Is this the beginning of the end for this segregation in the Institute's meeting room? Well, the gentlemen of the day can take comfort, 1924 saw the first ever Kleenex Tissue introduced, so they can at least dry their eyes.

Thankfully, today all are welcome to enjoy what Thornton Rust Institute can offer, including those from the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, North Yorkshire County Council, the National Trust, the Circle Dance Group and many other regular interest groups. All this though does not just happen by chance, it is the efforts of a forward-thinking management team totally committed to support each other and to create a philosophy where we can say 'yes, we can do that for you.' So, whenever an occasion arises, consider what the Institute can do for you and help secure the future of Thornton Rust Institute for many more years to come.
